Branch Executive Committee Meeting, March 20th

The meeting was called to order by Big Sir Tom Verkozen at 11:00 am. We circulated a get-well card for Ted Pullen who is undergoing an aortic valve replacement procedure today. We all signed the card to wish him well in his recovery. Tom showed us a photo board he has put together with pictures of various members he has had coffee "dates" with this year. He said he's had over 50 such dates and would like to continue to get to know members by this means. Treasurer Al Wuthnow showed us the financial report which listed our cash in the bank at \$8,323 as of Mar 1. Al gave out a form to be submitted for those who have expenses to be reimbursed. Drew Dowsett, a retired CPA, has been asked to become Asst Treasurer in preparation to succeed Al Wuthnow. Dick Robinson submitted a receipt for the purchased 10 hats with Sirs logos for a cost of \$191.

The minutes for the February Executive Board meeting were approved as published in the March Horologium. Kelley Reid reported our membership has now hit 110 members with the addition of 7 new members to be presented at the April 3 lunch. The new system of signing up for lunch, Zeffy, is working quite well. The only problem is a lineup at the table to get checked in for lunch. Those members signing up for guests online can get a reimbursement from Al Wuthnow by submitting a request form. We had a very good turnout at the March 5 lunch with some 73 persons attending including guests.

We had a lengthy discussion of our website led by Tom Short. He is working to incorporate more information into our website and make it more accessible to users. We approved motion for Tom to upgrade our website. Tom Verkozen showed us the roster booklet published by Branch 134 which contains more information and photos of members which is more than our booklet has this year. The question came up about where our roster information is stored for purposes of getting access to it. Ralph Sherer had been keeping roster information and passing it along to Robby Robinson for publication in our yearly roster booklet. Tom Short wanted to have access to this database to incorporate it in our website. Tom also expressed interest in obtaining files of the last several years of Horologiums.

The speakers for coming meetings were reviewed by Dr Bob Bundy. In April we will be hearing Kent Fortner from Mare Island Brewing Co, Dr Bundy said we'd be giving out 4 packs of beer for the birthday members at that meeting. In May we'll hear from John Powers representing The Villages which supply services to seniors in the community. Our June speaker will be a representative of Alzheimer's Disease Agency in Marin. Kelley Reid said he is still working to get in contact with Joan Ryan, the sportswriter as a possible speaker. And Tom Verkozen said that he learned about Gordon Haight's experiences as a writer for the New York Times which could be suitable as a meeting speaker.

Our ongoing activities include: (1) twice monthly outings of the walking/hiking group led by Michael

# APRIL SPEAKER **KENT FORTNER**

Kent is the Founder of the Mare Island Brewing Company, and President of the Mare Island Historic Park Foundation.

Having worked in fine-dining restaurants throughout his youth in Kansas, and heeding the "go west" mantra, Kent worked as a sommelier in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, and partnered in a wine shop in Boise, Idaho.

Moving further west to pursue his wine passion, Kent worked his first winery job for Beringer in Napa in 1993 and then continued graduate viticulture studies at UC Davis. What followed was a string of winemaking posts in the California's Central Coast (Chalone Vineyards), Washington State's Walla Walla area (Canoe Ridge Vineyards), Chile (Vina Calina, of Kendall Jackson), Argentina (Tapiz Winery), and Napa (Luna Vineyards). To date he has over 30 wine vintages at 26 different wineries under his belt.

In 2000, Kent launched his own Pinot Noir project, Road 31 Wine Co., crafting just a small quantity of one highly-prized Carneros Pinot Noir. Road 31 is a one-man band, with Kent serving as viticulturist, winemaker, salesperson and delivery boy. The small batch of sought-after wine sells out quickly each spring.

In 2013, Kent expanded his adventures from grape to grain, founding the Mare Island Brewing Co. with partner Ryan Gibbons (formerly of Lagunitas). The brewery focuses on small-batch artisan beers while celebrating the incredibly rich heritage of Mare Island, where the waterfront brewery and three taprooms are located. Mare Island Brewing Co. has grown to 80+ employees in its 10 years, a milestone celebrated in the 10episode podcast "Battleships to Beer" on the Brewer's Network.

### **BOOK CLUB**

The SIRs book club met on March 11th at Al Wuthnow's home in Mill Valley. We welcomed Tom Greenfield into the group for the first time, who joined Tom Verkozen, Alan Barr, John Davis, Tom Balough, Michael Sommers, Dave Cooke, and our gracious host Al.

This month's selection was "Tell Me Everything" by Elizabeth Strout. This book depicted relationships in small-town Maine and featured many of the same characters who had appeared in Strout's earlier books including the Pulitzer Prize winning "Olive Kitteridge". Everyone seemed to enjoy the book overall, despite its slow pace, rather like the towns in which it was set. But the characters and their interactions were skillfully rendered by the author and had a subtle depth that offered a lot of material for our group to discuss.



An element of poetry was added this month for the first time, thanks to Tom Balough. Some of the selections that were discussed included "Another Reason I Don't Keep a Gun in the House" by Billy Collins, "Yesterday" by W. S. Merwin, and "To Women, As Far As I'm Concerned" by D. H. Lawrence. These works were each striking in their own way, and there seemed to be a consensus that poetry was a good addition to our meeting and is a feature that we should keep. Also, John Davis read "The Second Coming" by W. B. Yeats and asked that we ponder and discuss it more deeply at the next meeting.

The book selected for next month is "The Wide Wide Seas" by Hampton Sides, which is a fascinating account of Captain James Cook's third and final epic voyage through Polynesia, Hawaii, and Alaska as he sought to fulfill his mission to find a northern passage above Alaska during the latter part of the 18th century. "The Wager" was also mentioned, which is another true story of seafaring adventure, this one involving a shipwreck on the Patagonian coast, complete with a mutiny among the survivors and a harrowing return to safety. "The Greatest Generation" by Tom Brokaw was favored by two people but was put aside for the moment due to the "Wuthnow Rule" which requires at least one person to have read the book before it is selected. This rule is so-named after Al Wuthnow who recommended "Raven Black" a few months ago based on the fact that it had been adapted into an excellent TV show, but apparently it was the screenwriters who worked wonders with a mediocre text. I'm sure that one or more of our group will tackle "The Greatest Generation" and recommend whether it be chosen for a future month.

Next month's meeting will be at 10 am on Tuesday April 8, again at Al's house at 214 Melrose Ave in Mill Valley. Hope to see you all there.
